Jesus is the Suffering Savior

He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. ... He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities, the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. – Isaiah 53:3,5

He took all this suffering on himself, including death on a cross, so that people wouldn't suffer eternally.

The second thing to remember is that we are talking about something very personal to all of us. We were the ones Jesus came to suffer for. We were the ones who were headed to the punishment of eternal separation from God. Our sinful thoughts, words, and actions condemned us. But as the prophet wrote, "He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities, the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed."

Jesus' love for us is deep and longlasting. It's not a shallow love that we might receive from others, or a love that is here today and gone tomorrow. Jesus' love is eternal. He promises that since he suffered and gave up his life for us, he will continue to love us each and every day.

New Church Organ



God has blessed St. Paul's for 150 years with his Grace. Out of thanks for God's grace, we began to undertake the project of replacing our existing organ. The final cost of the organ was \$58,150. To date, we have received \$49,377.

Confident that the Lord will continue to

bless our efforts, the decision was

made to purchase the new organ. By ordering it sooner than later, there were some significant cost savings.

During the week of February 1st, the new organ was installed here at St. Paul's. It is being used for the first time on February 7th and 8th in our worship services.

Wisconsin Lutheran High School's delegates met on February 3, 2016 to review how God is blessing our school. Pastor Phil Casmer from Christ the Lord, Brookfield, WI began the meeting with a devotion.

SEAT EXPANSION TASK FORCE REPORT

- Dr. John Kolander, the chairman, presented the task force's key findings and answered key questions. After conducting research and multiple interviews with the principals, pastors and parents of WELS schools which regularly cannot get into WLHS because of WLHS' limited Choice seats, found there is a desire for an alternative option. The task force came to the conviction that it is feasible to explore starting another WELS Choice high school in the city. Those who are stakeholders would expect it to have a distinctively Lutheran culture like WLHS and its grade schools; offer an intentional program for transition to high school; have ministry partnership with the city's WELS schools and congregations; provide extended resources for student success; and work in coordination-not competition-with WLHS. They feel that the Choice climate is right for this effort and there are opportunities for partnerships with MLC, WLC, foundations and businesses who care about the students whom WLHS is not able to serve. However, a new school would need its own governing board. It is also acknowledged that there are many challenges (e.g. govern-



ance, funding, policies, procedures, location, curricular program, staffing, etc.) that would be to be addressed before launching another school, especially under the umbrella of the WLHS Conference (if the delegates would want to do so). The board of WLHS is now ready to use grant money to hire or call a school developer who would work with a revised task force to explore the idea and develop a sound business plan over the next 18-24 months that could be brought to the delegates for approval.

TUITION RATE SET – The delegates set the 2016-2017 conference tuition rate for \$8,400 --even though the actual costs look to be \$11,910. Thank God for donors and churches who make up the difference!

PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES – The delegates gave input to several changes that will be proposed for a vote on June 1. These are a product of a study of delegate roles and responsibilities which are intended to make realistic expectations for numbers of delegates

from smaller congregations and to bring long-standing practices into line with by-laws of the conference. The board will now review the comments.

WLHS ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT - Pastor Kenneth Fisher, President of WLHS, reported that WLHS has dramatically increased its bandwidth as the school prepares to be able to move to an environment next year where every student will have his or her own Chromebook in class. In order to help the faculty prepare, they are receiving training and each is being issued a leased laptop to use in the classroom.

He also asked for prayers for Pastor Phil Huebner who holds our Campus Pastor call. He noted with joy that our wrestlers have repeated as Dual Conference Champions. He explained that there were several improvements in the works including increased cameras and new door security measures that would soon be installed. He praised God for leading a new international student to be baptized, too. Finally, he noted that this summer, the last of the old roof sections will be replaced, as part of a plan to address some of the long-term maintenance needs of the school.

CONFERENCE FINANCIAL REPORT – Mr. Mark Albrecht, the Conference treasurer, reviewed the financial statements for the current year which showed the Conference making its loan payments on schedule.

The meeting closed with viewing the new recruitment video and a prayer.

Conference of Presidents holds its winter meeting



The Conference of Presidents (COP) met for its winter meeting on Jan. 11-15. Here are some of the highlights:

The COP said farewell to Nebraska District President Rev. Earle Treptow, who was attending his last meeting before beginning his work as a professor at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. Rev. Phil Hirsch is serving as the interim district president. Rev. Joel Zank, president of the Northern Wisconsin District, was appointed to replace Treptow as a COP representative on the Synodical Council.

With five months remaining in the One in Christ debt retirement effort, \$1.4 million had been received from congregations and individuals (the total is now above \$1.5 million). The district presidents will continue to encourage congregations to continue this effort through the end of June.

The COP authorized the appointment of a special committee to discuss the work of the Ministry of Christian Giving and to bring recommendations for any changes to the COP. The review is not in response to any problem but is simply an effort to be sure that the Ministry of Christian Giving is functioning in the most beneficial way.

The COP resolved that a special committee will review the staff ministry program, especially with the purpose of clarifying definitions and policies and ensuring consistency throughout the synod in how staff ministers are trained, called, and utilized.

The COP has asked the synod president to bring recommendations for ways to improve the preparation of delegates for synod conventions.

The COP adopted "364 Days of Thanksgiving" (developed by Rev. An-

drew Schroer) as the synod's stewardship emphasis for 2016.

There are 81 vacancies for full-time pastor positions, with 71 of those in congregations. The remaining 10 are vacant missionary, professor, or other pastor-trained positions. This number of vacant pastor positions is still well below the level at which it would become a concern.

The 2015 synod convention passed a resolution asking the Synodical Council to give high priority to the calling of a director for Youth and Family Ministry. After consultation with the Commission on Youth and Family Ministry and the Commission on Adult Discipleship, the COP was convinced that a director should be called to serve as director of both commissions. The COP is asking that the Synodical Council give this position high priority on the list of unfunded programs.

Fifty speakers fire up MLC students at Evangelism Day



"Your Kingdom Come" was the theme of Martin Luther College's 11th annual Evangelism Day on Jan. 20.

The day opened with worship led by Rev. Mark Jeske, pastor at St. Marcus, Milwaukee, Wis., and Time of Grace Ministries. Then about 50 pastors, teachers, missionaries, staff ministers, and lay leaders addressed students about what's happening out there and how students can further prepare themselves to share the gospel: with Mormons, with the poor, in Spanish, in urban centers, on digital platforms, through early childhood ministries the list goes on and on.

One highlight this year was a presentation by an MLC student on the persecution of Christians in Syria. This student, a Syrian Christian himself, has taken Bible classes and joined our fellowship. His family remains in Syria and we pray for them.

Another highlight was a presentation by Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary Professor Daniel Leyrer, who spoke specifically to junior and senior men in pre -seminary studies about how they can equip their future congregations for evangelism.

MLC conducts its annual Evangelism Day in conjunction with the WELS Commission on Evangelism and Commission on Lutheran Schools. All students attend a blend of required and elective workshops.

"It's a day set aside so that the Spirit can fill the hearts of both faculty and students with excitement and gratitude," said MLC President Mark Zarling. "Excitement as we learn more about the amazing things the Lord Jesus is doing through the gospel. Gratitude as we think of almost 50 people who come to New Ulm and share with us the good news about the power of the Good News."

Students responded enthusiastically to the day, each with their own memories of the speaker who brought them to tears, the ministry opportunity they'd never considered before, the "aha moment." "This day not only motivates us all," Zarling continued, "but it keeps us grounded in our mission as a college and our connection to the Great Commission."

WELS Schools Accreditation



The WELS Commission on Lutheran Schools accreditation process for WELS early childhood schools, grade schools, and high schools is seeing significant growth.

WELS School Accreditation (WELSSA) evaluates a school's ministry based on Scripture and sound educational principles.

Mr. Tom Plitzuweit, associate director of the WELS Commission on Lutheran Schools, explains that schools are evaluated on 15 different standards during a three-day visit at the school. The standards center around all WELS schools' core mission—to share God's Word. Both strengths and weaknesses are evaluated, and after the visit, the school develops an improvement plan to maintain strengths and improve weaknesses that correlates with the five-year accreditation cycle.

Mr. Mark Otte, principal at Nebraska Evangelical Lutheran High School, Waco, Neb., says, "There are many benefits to going through the accreditation process as any time you take an indepth look at everything you do you are bound to find reasons to rejoice and thank God for the blessings that he has bestowed on your school. Accreditation also will cause you to question and perhaps improve your school in ways that you might not consider. The single greatest benefit to the accreditation process is it focuses you back on the fundamental reasons why your school exists, which is to share the gospel with families and children."

Currently, 118 early childhood centers, grade schools, and high schools are WELSSA accredited, with projections reaching 130 accredited schools by the end of 2017.

"We want to do our best with what God has given us, and we want to share God's Word with the next generation. In order to do that, schools can compare the quality of their programs against nationally recognized standards in a yearlong self-study process," says Plitzuweit. "As WELSSA continues to grow, we have a need for more people to serve on site teams. This year we had over 100 captains, consultants, and team members, and as it grows we will need even more. We already have 36 site visits scheduled for 2016-2017, which is the highest year we have ever had."

While WELSSA is a synod accreditation, it is also recognized nationally as part of the National Council for Private School Accreditation as well as many smaller private accreditation agencies and state accreditation agencies.

Mr. Matthew Bauer, principal at St. Mark's Lutheran School, Citrus Heights, Calif., says, "Being accredited is an easy way to communicate to current and prospective families that we take our mission of 'serving families with excellence in Christian education' very seriously."
